A Proclamation By Governor Ronnie Musgrove

WHEREAS, the American Legion was organized in 1919 and is composed of veterans of the armed forces of the United States—there are 89 Senior Auxiliaries and 88 Junior Auxiliaries in the State of Mississippi; and

WHEREAS, during World War I, poppies covered the landscape of the ravaged battlefields of Belgium—the pretty little flower grew wild, even surrounded by death and destruction, serving as a reminder of the blood shed during that and future wars—in 1921, the American Legion Auxiliary adopted the poppy as the organization's memorial flower and pledged its use to the benefit of our servicemen and their families; and

WHEREAS, the American Legion hosts a Miss Poppy and Little Miss Poppy Contest every year for Junior members of the American Legion Auxiliary between the ages of 6 and 18; and

WHEREAS, participants in the Miss Poppy and Little Miss Poppy Contest must complete a number of requirements such as the Scrapbook Entry, which highlights the accomplishments of each contestant throughout the year and her service to veterans and the community—the focus of the event is to promote the American Legion Auxiliary Poppy; and

WHEREAS, trophies are presented to the Miss Poppy and Little Miss Poppy winners at the State Convention and are submitted to Nationals for judging:

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Ronnie Musgrove, Governor of the State of Mississippi, do hereby proclaim June 15, 2002, as

Miss Poppy and Little Miss Poppy Day

in the State of Mississippi.
