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Hugh Reid Miller Collection

The **Hugh Reid and Susan Walton Miller Family Papers** will be opened to researchers on **July 18**. Hugh Miller, born in South Carolina in 1813, married Susan Gray Walton of Cotton Gin Port, Mississippi, in 1839, and the couple had two children, George and Edwin Hugh. The Millers settled in Pontotoc County, where Hugh Miller practiced law (1835-39), then served in the Mississippi House of Representatives (1841-43) and as circuit judge of the seventh district. In 1854, he helped organize the **Pontotoc Male Academy** and in 1860 was elected as a delegate to the State Convention, where he was one of the **"Committee of Fifteen"** who drafted the Ordinance of Secession. In March, 1861, he organized the **"Pontotoc Minutemen"** (Company G, Second Regiment, Mississippi Infantry) and in 1862 organized the **Forty-Second Regiment, Mississippi Infantry**. He died in 1863 at Gettysburg, Pennsylvania, as a result of wounds sustained at

the battle of Cemetery Hill. Both of his sons also fought in the Civil War.

Of particular interest are **annotated typescripts** prepared by one of the collection donors, Robert F.



Sov. Comm. Photos Rescanned

MDAH staff members have rescanned photographs in the Mississippi State Sovereignty Commission Records using a high-quality scanner and have posted the images on the MDAH Web site, mdah.state.ms.us. MDAH invites researchers to visit the online Sovereignty Commission papers and use the "Photograph Search" to access the improved images. The Commission was the

state's official segregation watchdog agency from 1956 to 1973. The collection consists of approximately 133,000 pages of material, including 913 photographs.
